

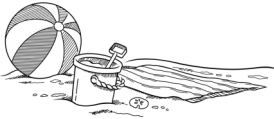

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### Pastor’s Page

*“Why would a family want to join our church? It doesn’t have anything for youth.”*

Friends,

Have you heard any comments like this one before? It’s a stressor for many small churches to see full “youth and children’s programs” offered by larger congregations. The Presbytery of the James is reaching out to smaller churches to build such programming by bringing youth of smaller membership churches together at the new Glen Allen “Jumpology” trampoline park. Perhaps it’s a good idea, and for the kids who want it, I hope it takes off. However, I dare say that our small church envy of active “youth programs” may be misguided. Young people spend plenty of time with their peers, and are increasingly the objects of marketing campaigns to keep them entertained and to fill up their time. The church can easily become one more program in fierce competition with the rest. As one online book review put it, “The sound and fury that has characterized youth ministry for so long has left too many youth workers tired and too many young people disillusioned.”

So what can we, as Ashland Presbyterian Church, do to reach out to young people in a different kind of way, perhaps even in a deeper kind of way? If we put our presumptions aside and began to imagine loving young people as God our loving parent might have us do, what might that look like? First, it may mean letting go of the notion that “families joining the church” is the ultimate goal. What if our goal was the church joining those families instead? I am sure that there are

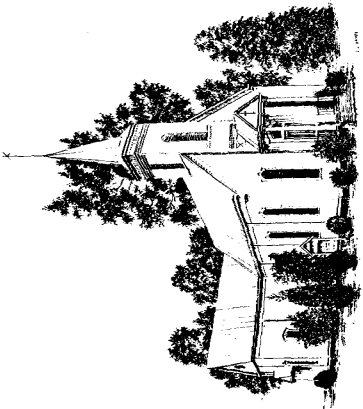
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## FUN MUSICAL OPPORTUNITIES IN JULY

## “Psalms for Singing”



On **July 28** and **August 4** I’m very happy to have the chance to teach a Christian education course on the subject of the Psalms as an instrument of modern worship. Though I suspect most of us realize that psalm singing was a part of the tradition of worship of biblical Israel and even the early Christian church, many of us may not be aware of the continuing tradition of using psalms as a vehicle for worship beyond the biblical era. The class, over two sessions, will address the biblical evidence for singing psalms, the church’s use of psalms over the centuries (with special attention to John Calvin’s ideas about singing psalmody), and the resurgence of interest in singing psalms in the modern church, both in worship and private devotion. And you will also have plenty of opportunity to sing psalms for yourself.

Until we have the setting exactly set where we want it to be for our congregation, please come prepared. Many thanks for your patience as we move through the next several weeks.

As we are looking at ways we can keep our selves both cool at this time of the year and warm in the winter, and control the cost of heating and air conditioning, I have a request as chairman of the Worship Committee.

If each of us make a real effort to keep the Sanctuary doors closed each time we go through them, (both rear and narthex area) if at all possible, we will be doing our share to help the situation.

I know this is not in our general routine to do, but this would help the Building and Grounds committee with cutting bill costs, because as you know the back of the church building is not centrally air conditioned during the summer, and in the winter it helps to control the heat for the Sanctuary.

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young people – children, teenagers, college students that you know. What if you chose to join that family that just popped into your mind? It's not quite as ridiculous as it sounds. When you join an organization, you spend time there, you care about its values, you serve its purposes. Imagine if our church were dedicated to joining families, spending time with them, caring about their values, serving to help them meet their best interests.

It may seem like too great an investment of our energy. Jesus tells us that everyone knows how to give something so they will receive something in return. We want to think that what we choose to do as a congregation will yield plentiful results and expand all our numbers upward.
